The Dreamer

Genesis 37:5-11

5 Now Joseph had a dream, and when he told it to his brothers they hated him even more. 6 He said to them, "Hear this dream that I have dreamed: 7 Behold, we were binding sheaves in the field, and behold, my sheaf arose and stood upright. And behold, your sheaves gathered around it and bowed down to my sheaf." 8 His brothers said to him, "Are you indeed to reign over us? Or are you indeed to rule over us?" So they hated him even more for his dreams and for his words.

9 Then he dreamed another dream and told it to his brothers and said, "Behold, I have dreamed another dream. Behold, the sun, the moon, and eleven stars were bowing down to me." 10 But when he told it to his father and to his brothers, his father rebuked him and said to him, "What is this dream that you have dreamed? Shall I and your mother and your brothers indeed come to bow ourselves to the ground before you?" 11 And his brothers were jealous of him, but his father kept the saying in mind.

To Shechem and Dothan

Genesis 37

12 Now his brothers went to pasture their father's flock near Shechem. 13 And Israel said to Joseph, "Are not your brothers pasturing the flock at Shechem? Come, I will send you to them." And he said to him, "Here I am." 14 So he said to him, "Go now, see if it is well with your brothers and with the flock, and bring me word." So he sent him from the Valley of Hebron, and he came to Shechem. 15 And a man found him wandering in the fields. And the man asked him, "What are you seeking?" 16 "I am seeking my brothers," he said. "Tell me, please, where they are pasturing the flock." 17 And the man said, "They have gone away, for I heard them say, 'Let us go to Dothan." So Joseph went after his brothers and found them at Dothan.

Confusion

Genesis 37

Ishmaelites coming from Gilead, with their camels bearing gum, balm, and myrrh, on their way to carry it down to Egypt. 26 Then Judah said to his brothers, "What profit is it if we kill our brother and conceal his blood? 27 Come, let us sell him to the Ishmaelites, and let not our hand be upon him, for he is our brother, our own flesh." And his brothers listened to him. 28 Then Midianite traders passed by. And they drew Joseph up and lifted him out of the pit, and sold him to the Ishmaelites for twenty shekels[c] of silver. They took Joseph to Egypt.

36 Meanwhile the Midianites had sold him in Egypt to Potiphar, an officer of Pharaoh, the captain of the guard.

29 When Reuben returned to the pit and saw that Joseph was not in the pit, he tore his clothes 30 and returned to his brothers and said, "The boy is gone, and I, where shall I go?" (lit. "where am I to come?")

Potiphar's Wife

Genesis 39

Now Joseph was handsome in form and appearance. 7 And after a time his master's wife cast her eyes on Joseph and said, "Lie with me."

8 But he refused and said to his master's wife, "Behold, because of me my master has no concern about anything in the house, and he has put everything that he has in my charge. 9 He is not greater in this house than I am, nor has he kept back anything from me except you, because you are his wife. How then can I do this great wickedness and sin against God?" 10 And as she spoke to Joseph day after day, he would not listen to her, to lie beside her or to be with her.

Joseph's punishment His wife avoided language of rape / sex in speaking to her husband He didn't listen to the details of his wife's story

Pharaoh calls the "scribes of the House of Life"

Pharaoh explains the dream in detail to them

They cannot explain it

Pharaoh is apparently not upset by this, he just accepts it

Nebuchadnezzar's

Daniel 2:2-13 1 Nebuchadnezzar had dreams; his mind was troubled and he could not

1 Nebuchadnezzar had dreams; his mind was troubled and he could not sleep. 2 So the king summoned the magicians, enchanters, sorcerers and astrologers to tell him what he had dreamed.

He does not tell them what his dream was (because he doesn't remember)

5 The king replied to the astrologers, "This is what I have firmly decided: If you do not tell me what my dream was and interpret it, I will have you cut into pieces and your houses turned into piles of rubble.

10 The astrologers answered the king, "There is no one on earth who can do what the king asks!..."

12 This made the king so angry and furious that he ordered the execution of all the wise men of Babylon.

Egypt vs. Babylon

Egypt:


- Characterized by order, tradition, custom, law, ritual
- You don't mess around with dream interpretation
- The magicians didn't dare make up an interpretation
- Pharaoh didn't threaten to punish them for not being able to interpret the dreams

Babylon:

- Characterized by arbitrary power unbound by law
- The magicians were perfectly willing to make something up an interpretation, and Nebuchadnezzar knew it
- Nebuchadnezzar was perfectly willing to execute them all for failing to interpret an unknown dream, something that had never been expected of them before


Egyptian Dream Book

Joseph Installed as Vizier



A New Name

Gen 41:45 "And Pharaoh called Joseph's name Zaphnath-Paaneah. And he gave him as a wife Asenath, the daughter of Poti-Pherah priest of On. So Joseph went out over all the land of Egypt."

Zaphnath-Paaneah = God speaks and he lives

Asenath = Belonging to Neit [goddess of war and creation]
Poti-Pherah = given by Ra [sun god]

Pharaoh brings Joseph to new life as vizier God brings Joseph to new life

A Foreigner as Vizier?

Genesis 41: 39-41, 43-44

39 So Pharaoh said to Joseph, "Since God has shown you all this, there is none so discreet and wise as you are; 40 you shall be over my house, and all my people shall order themselves as you command; only as regards the throne will I be greater than you." 41 And Pharaoh said to Joseph, "Behold, I have set you over all the land of Egypt."... 43 Thus he set him over all the land of Egypt. 44 Moreover Pharaoh said to Joseph, "I am Pharaoh, and without your consent no man shall lift up hand or foot in all the land of Egypt."

- Several instances of foreign viziers in Egyptian history
- Sesostris I had a foreign vizier (was it Joseph?)
- A foreign vizier posed no threat of usurpation or coup
